Structural Characterization of PETase toward Superior Poly(ethylene terephthalate) Degradation

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Plastics, including poly(ethylene terephthalate) (PET), are very popular with their desirable characteristics. However, non-biodegradability, once thought to be great merit of plastics, causes the severe environmental problem. With the recently found PET-degrading bacterium, *Ideonella sakaiensis*, its possible use in microbial PET degradation becomes considerable. Here we firstly report the crystal structure of *I. sakaiensis* PETase (*Is*PETase) with high resolution. It helps to confirm the catalytic features of *Is*PETase and predict its molecular mechanism on degrading PET. Moreover, we succeed in developing the variant of *Is*PETase with 32.4% enhanced PET-degradability over its wild type using structural-based protein engineering. In this study, the reasons *Is*PETase has superior activity were successfully predicted with the 3D structure and related biochemical studies.
